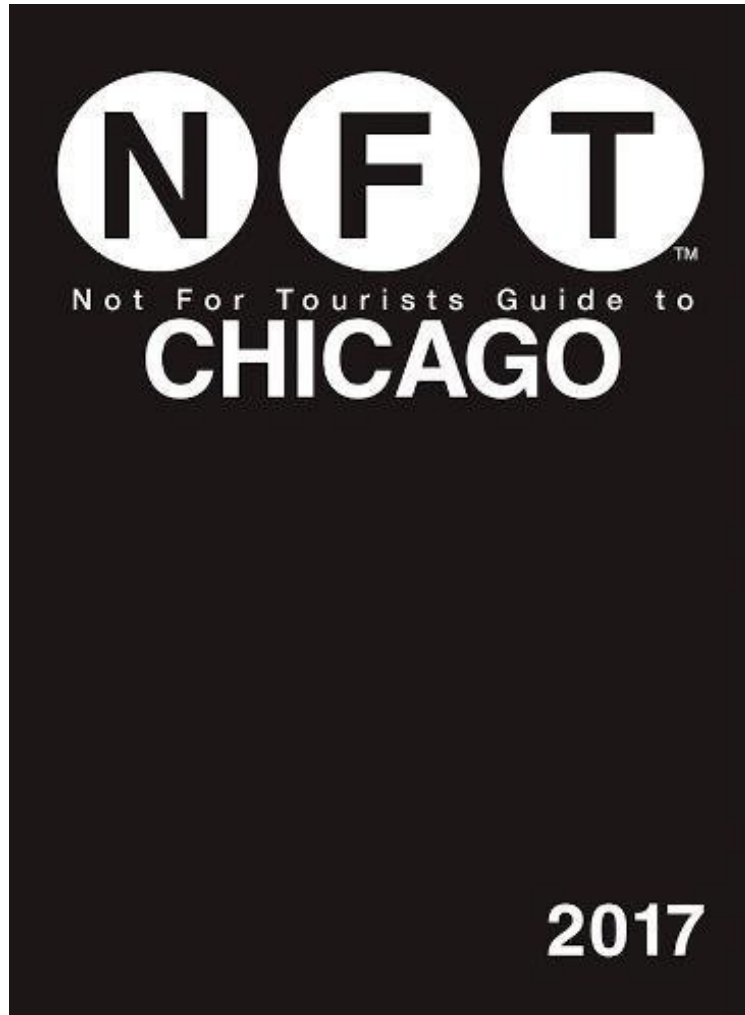

But the folks who publish this series aren't doing their readers any favor by dumbing down the books as the years go by. Between 2009 and 2015 the NYC guide lost 80 pages. And from 2012 to 2017, the Chicago guide -- under review here -- lost 100 pages. If those pages were dispensable, why weren't they omitted in the earlier editions?On a recent trip to Chicago, I discovered that the 2017 guide recommended a restaurant, a toy store, and a bookstore that were all permanently closed. Granted, paper can't

keep up with changing commercial establishments, but if we're going to have to check our cell phones for that sort of information, the value of a book is correspondingly diminished. And with people increasingly relying on the Internet for travel recommendations, the end of printed guides is probably in sight. The NFT people have presumably recognized this, since they maintain an informative website -- where much of the information in the book is available for free.³ of 3 people found the following review helpful.
