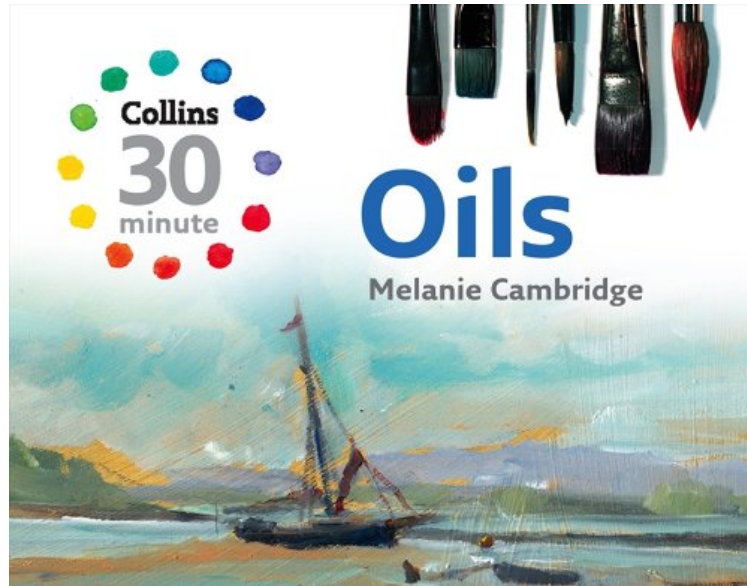

This book is not for absolute beginners who don't know a filbert from a fan brush. It is best for folks who already know a few basic techniques. This book is not designed to tell you how to stretch a canvas or prime a canvas with gesso, or to discuss the various types of oils. It is about how to do quick studies in oil. There are three step-by-step half-hour demonstrations, three recommended projects, and "Quick Tips" provided throughout the book. Each chapter ends with a "Quick Overview. There is a one-page index. The explanations and pictures used to illustrate the ideas are clear and useful. The color rendition in this book appears to be excellent. Cambridge teaches painting workshops in the U. K., and the text and the tips almost sound like what a workshop instructor would be saying--to-the-point without excessive detail. Cambridge's painting style is impressionistic and relaxed, and I like nearly all of the paintings reproduced in this book..So how does she manage to finish paintings in 30 minutes? There are four main factors:-Paint small pictures. Many of the originals she shows are 8" x 10", and some are as small as 4" x 6"-Use comparatively large brushes (relative to canvas size). She uses brushes with synthetic bristles--a No. 7 long bright, a No. 4 round, and a No. 4 round watercolor brush.-Work wet-on-wet.-Simplify the subject matter.I think that painters less experienced than Cambridge will require more than 30' per painting since their color mixtures might not be "right on" at the first attempt. Also, it may be hard to estimate how the colors will blend if one hasn't had a lot of experience working wet-on-wet, and it's harder to correct mistakes on a wet canvas. However, using her methods the painting process will speed up considerably and the quagmire of fussy detail will be avoided.Steve Allrich's "Oil Painting for the Serious Beginner" is excellent (except for the color printing) and more comprehensive than this book. Galton's "The Encyclopedia of Oil Painting Techniques" is also excellent for both beginning and experienced painters, and comprehensive. But these are not the type of book that Melanie

Cambridge intended to write (although she does briefly cover things like tonal value, composition, and color mixing-- for example, she has a page illustrating four different ways of producing different greens).
