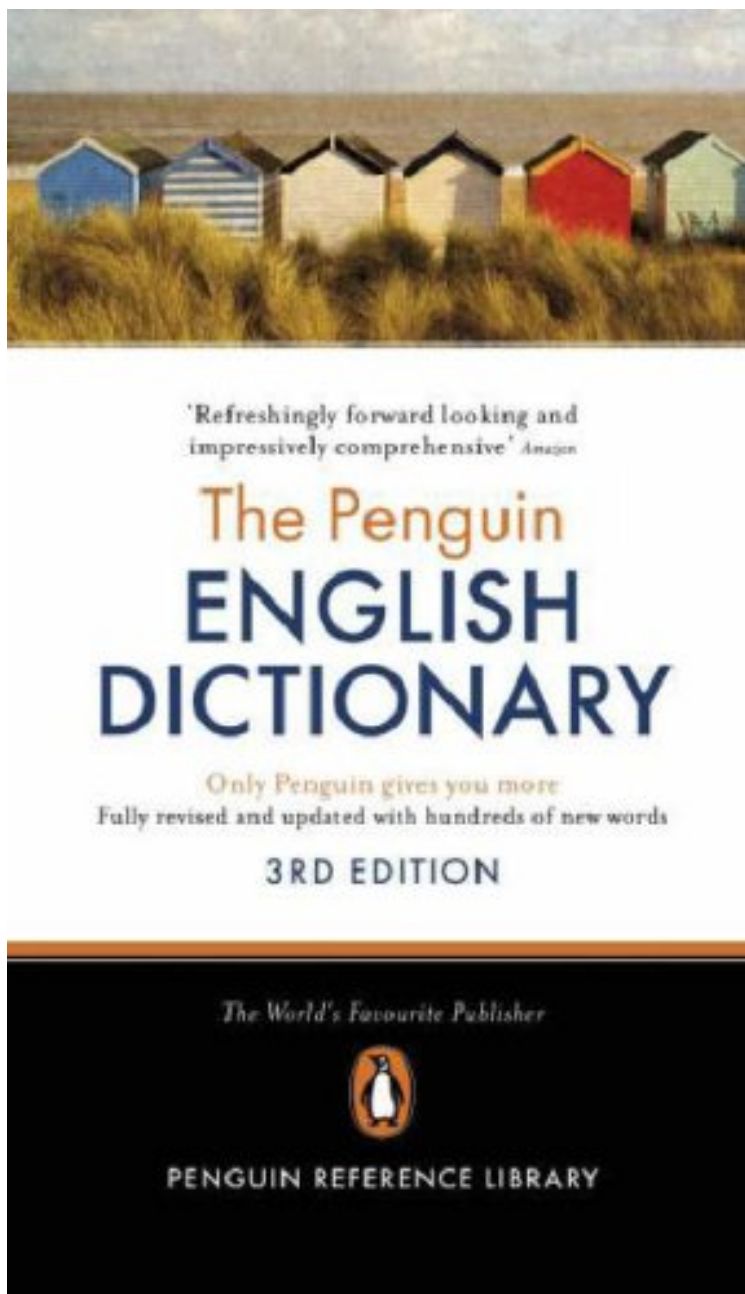

The Penguin third edition is an outstanding feat of lexicography. The font is uncluttered and easy on the eye, and the definition is clear without being long-winded. To me it is easily the best dictionary out there for collegiate use and maybe even for researchers. I own an Oxford Dictionary of English - the largest single volume dictionary one can find - and I refer to that huge tome only when I can't find a word in the Penguin, which is seldom indeed.It's a shame then that I have to report, after one year of infrequent use, that the binding of this hardback fell apart. I am left with a naked dictionary with pages coming off the first pages, and the glued spine also getting unstuck. The result is that I have to scour through definitions without the hard cover. The dictionary will not survive another year of use. It's a shame really because this dictionary has become my all-time favorite dictionary and Robert Allen my favorite lexicographer. It will be replaced by a Concise Oxford English Dictionary when its time is up.What prompted this comment is that I discovered in a bookshop not far away from my neighborhood two unsold Penguin Dictionaries, and they all suffered from the same problem. The glue of both stock have come apart, despite its pages being uncut at this time. Right now my Penguin, under intensive care, is still put into use for the reading of Anthony Trollope's "Barchester Towers". Like the dean in that book, the Penguin's years will be soon up. A shame really, after all the good effort put in by Robert Allen and his team.
