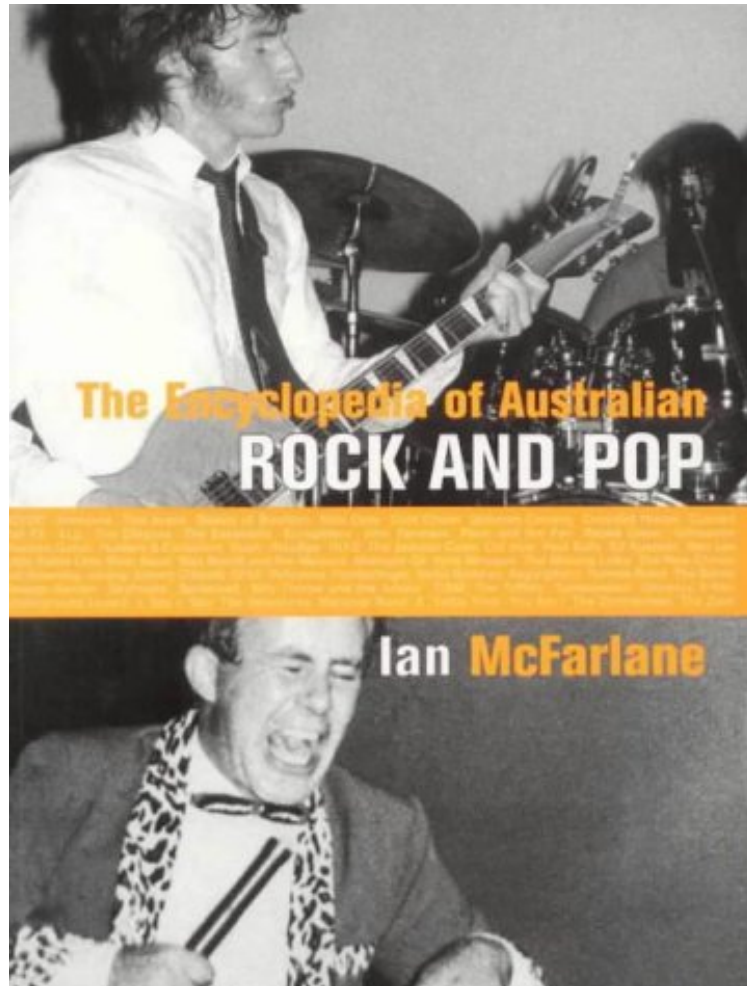

Primarily an A-Z reference of Down Under's pop music personalities and groups, the tome also provides a brief history of the musical development in the country. The 870-plus entries comprise such relevant information as career overview, band personnel, line-up changes, records released, other major events and achievements, and album/CD discographies. McFarlane, a rock journalist, writes solidly, and one will find a surprising number of Australian-American connections. Nevertheless, this work is too highly specialized for most American library patrons, who can get information about most Australian acts from more general or American-oriented music reference works.
