Instead, this book has the following scratch and sniffs...- Corn (Kettle Corn)- Rye- Malt (Can't actually smell it in the book, unless it smells like cardboard)- Vanilla- Cinnamon- Toast (smells like wood)- Rasins/Prunes- Hazelnuts- Sandalwood- Caramel (99% sure this scratch and sniff was actually missing the sniff part)- Iodine/Ocean (smelled like soap)- Peat/Smoke- Cedar- Maple- Apple- Honey If you don't know what majority of those smell like, this might be the perfect book for you. However, if you're like me and you are looking for different scents of whiskey to broaden your knowledge, this is NOT the book you're looking for. Another disappointment is that it is printed like a child's book. What I mean by this is that it is on big thick board pages. Like cardboard, the kind of book your kid ends up chewing on.
